March 29-31, 2008

As a continuation of February convention at Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh, Uttar Pradesh, the Second National Convention on Testing and Evaluation was held at the Tamil University, Thanjavur, Tamilnadu. It was organised by the NTS-India, CIIL, Mysore in collaboration with Tamil University, Bharatidasan University (Trichy), National Institute of Technology (Trichy) and Periyar Maniyammai University (Thanjavur).

The following were the broad objectives of the convention :

- To create awareness about the importance of evaluation as a quality control mechanism among the academics, educational planners, decision makers, administrators and policy implementing authorities.
- To obtain feedback & suggestions on the base materials developed by the NTS.
- To build up national consensus on the materials developed and methodology adopted.

The inaugural session of the convention began at 10 AM on 29th March 2008 in *Karikaala Choolan Kalaiyarangam*, the main auditorium of Tamil University. The session was attended by about 1000 scholars from various parts of the country including 600 registered participants. Prof. G. Bhaskaran, Registrar, Tamil University welcomed the gathering. Prof. C. Subramaniam, Vice-Chancellor, Tamil University presided over the session. Thiru. M. Kutralingam, Secretary,

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School Education, Government of Tamil Nadu, in his inaugural address observed that only 7% of the student community has access to higher education and called upon the NTS to look into such issues in order to ensure equal opportunity to everyone. Prof. P. Ramasamy, Vice-Chancellor, Alagappa University, Karaikudi, drew the attention of the academics in general and NTS-India in particular to the declining trend in the standard of education. Prof. M.Thangarasu, Vice-Chancellor, Periyar University, Salem emphasized the importance of teaching mother tongue while Prof. G. Ponnusamy, President, National Council of Teacher-Education, South Zone, Bangalore, stressed the need for improving the assessment system in the country.

Prof. Pon Subbiah, Head, NTS-India, in his powerpoint presentation introduced the programme by enlightening the audience about the objectives, applications and beneficiaries of NTS along with the rationale behind the formulation of such a vital scheme of national importance. Dr. M. Balakumar, Coordinator of the convention proposed vote of thanks.

The technical session held in the afternoon was devoted to explain the work done by the Centre for Testing and Evaluation in general and NTS in particular. The centre's website www.ciil-miles.net also was introduced. This was followed by a demonstration of the MILES retrieval system by the NTS technical team consisting Ms. R.Shakunthala, Mr. K.S.Raghavan, Mr. V.K. Dheerajj, and Mr. B.L. Mahesh.

In the forenoon session on 30th March, the Head, NTS-India briefed about the innovative materials evolved by the NTS. It was followed by a general session in which scholars were given the copies of the materials with a request to record their views and observations about them. The session was moderated by Prof. Swaminathan Pillai, Former Director, NITTTR, Chennai.

In the afternoon session, five different groups were formed to have critical analysis and observations of the materials supplied to them. Each group was headed by a senior academician, and assisted by NTS representatives, as detailed below:

The brain storming sessions of the above groups continued in the next day i.e., 31st March too. Scholars who participated in the groups were trying to arrive at a consensus on the issues discussed.

The cultural programmes arranged by Prof. M. Ramasamy, Dept. of Drama, Tamil University (during the evenings of 29^{th} and 30^{th}) were well received and enjoyed by the participants.

On 31st March, valedictory function was held at about 12.30 PM. Prof. Pon Subbiah, welcomed the gathering. This was followed by a briefing about the activities held in the general as well as technical sessions. The academic reports were presented by the respective group leaders. Prof. M. Ponnavaikko, Vice-Chancellor, Bharathidasan University, presided over the function. In his presidential remark, he stressed the need for a mechanism to conduct tests at various entry levels. Prof. C. Subramaniam, Vice-Chancellor, Tamil University, in his special address, stressed the need for a well formulated testing and evaluation mechanism. Prof. M. Chidambaram, the Director, NIT-Trichy, in his brief address, welcomed the creation of NTS-India. He also

emphasised the need for providing explanation of various concepts in the local languages concerned. Prof.N.Ramachandran, Vice-Chancellor, Periyar Maniyammai University, in his brief speech, stressed the need for collective wisdom in fulfilling the objectives of a national scheme such as NTS. Prof. Balasundaram Pillai, former Vice-Chancellor, Jaffna University, Sri Lanka, talked on the role of knowledge based society in economic growth. Prof. R. Radhakrishnan, Vice-Chancellor, Anna University, Coimbatore, suggested that the activities of the NTS should be extended to all the disciplines of studies. Prof. Silamboli Sellappan, Member, Tamil Development Board, in his valedictory address, insisted that the academics should find out a way to eliminate the inconsistencies and inadequacies that are found in the education system in general and evaluation system in particular.

With a vote of thanks from Prof. G. Bhaskaran, the Registrar, Tamil University, the convention came to an end in the after noon of 31st March.

Current Activities

- ► Developing Training Modules on Testing & Evaluation : So far 27 scholars (out of about 100 applicants) have been identified for preparing modules based on the synopses provided by them. Out of whom, 8 scholars have submitted final draft of the modules. Two scholars have been requested to revise their synopses. Thirty synopses have been received afresh which are under consideration for allotment by the committee constituted for this purpose.

It was inaugurated by Prof. Amar Jyoti Chaudhary, Vice Chancellor, Gauhati University. Prof. Abu Leis and Prof. D.N. Bezboruah, ELT experts of the state, were the guests of honour. The CIIL was represented by Dr. Bhamati Devi, Principal, NERLC, Gauhati, and the CT&E by Dr. Basanti Devi, SRP, NTS-India. The seminar focused on problems of

Language Teaching in India in general and in Assam in particular with reference to English.

The seminar was followed by a two-day Workshop on Language Pedagogy. The following were the recommendations of the workshop :

- Introduction of language specific courses at undergraduate level for improving proficiency.
- Reformation of curriculum.
- Refresher courses for college teachers.

Both the programmes were conceived and coordinated by Dr. Anita Tamuli, HOD of ELT, Gauhati University, in association with the Dept. of Linguistics with financial support from the CIIL through its CT & E.

More About NTS-India

What is National Testing Service-India (NTS-India)?

National Testing Service-India is a mega scheme of the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. National Policy on Education and Programme of Action (1986) and Central Advisory Board on Education (1992) have recommended the implementation of this scheme. The Centre for Testing and Evaluation, an R & D unit of the Central Institute of Indian Languages, has been entrusted with the responsibility of implementing this scheme. NTS aims to cater to all the testing and evaluation needs of the country at all the levels of education. Though the NTS has eventually to encompass all the disciplines of the study, initially, it will focus on language and literature.

Why is it called NTS-India?

NTS is there in other countries also. There is one in Pakisthan. India has been incorporated in the title to make a distinction.

Why is CIIL selected for this scheme?

Yes, there is a reason why CIIL was preferred. The Centre for Testing and Evaluation, CIIL has done original research in this relatively unexplored area and brought out a number of publications on testing and evaluation. Considering its track record in research, man power, infrastructure and also the training imparted to various sections of schools, the Govt. of India has rightly chosen CIIL to implement this scheme.

What are the objectives of NTS-India?

There are specific objectives. It is very difficult to maintain uniformity in education in India given her multitude, multilingualism, multi-culturalism and diversified education system. Thus the main objective of NTS-India is to establish national and regional norms. Formulation of concept based continuum of graded syllabi for the courses in various disciplines at all the seven levels of general education (to start with Indian Languages) is another main objective of NTS. The third important objective is to develop corresponding tools and scales of measurement for determining competence in respective disciplines. Fourthly, it aims to standardize these tools and scales. NTS proposes to develop a centralized mechanism of quality control to determine the competence (to begin with language competence) of an individual on a common scale keeping the whole nation under its purview. The development of 'sampling-error-free' graded tests to assess the students is another goal of NTS. As mentioned earlier, the focus will be on language courses initially and will be extended to other disciplines as well.

What are its applications?

NTS will help to maintain inter-language comparability across the different languages at the national level and intra-language comparability at the regional levels. It will accredit the courses of study and subsequently the institutes which are involved in teaching / training those courses. Besides, it will help in deciding one's aptitude, achievement and proficiency (in native, second and foreign language contexts before extending to other disciplines) for admission, certification and employment purposes by developing appropriate types of tests. Consequently, this will lead to delinking of degrees from jobs in the future. Apart from specialised and

One and the Same : Difference in the name

Selection Type Question / Item refers to any question item that is classified under objective category. It includes constant alternatives, multiple choice, multiple facet, matching and rearrangement types. Each of this type is provided with a few alternatives of which the correct / suitable one is to be selected. In other words, the items of this category require an examinee to select the correct / most suitable one as answer from among the alternatives provided.

Fixed Response Question / Item is one for which the responses are already fixed in the forms of options or alternatives. It requires the examinee to select the right one from among the given alternatives. Hence, it is nothing but a selection type item. These items find a place usually in objective category of tests.

Close Ended Question / Item also refers to an objective type one having a single predetermined correct answer. It is also characterized as fixed response question, and sometimes as selection type item.

general educational institutions recruitment agencies like UPSC, SSC, etc., will also be benefitted from the tools and scales developed by the NTS-India.

What is meant by inter-language and intra-language comparability?

There are about 400 Universities in this country most of which conduct language courses. There is no way of knowing whether these courses are comparable or not. NTS intends to evolve a centralized mechanism which will ensure comparability. When the comparison is between the courses of different languages we call it interlanguage comparability. (For e.g., M.A course in Bengali is compared with an M.A course in Tamil or Marathi). We talk of intra-language comparability when we compare the degrees in a particular discipline awarded by different universities. (For e.g., an M.A course in Hindi from Banaras Hindu University with that of Mysore University).

Is NTS-India meant only for language testing?

No, it is not meant exclusively for language. As mentioned earlier NTS will take up all the disciplines in due course. However, we have decided to work on language in the beginning.

Is it for any particular language?

NTS will work on all the scheduled Indian languages in a phased manner. At the moment three Languages viz. Hindi, Tamil and Urdu have been taken up. The work is in progress in all the three languages. Another set of three languages will be added shortly.
